

Media Backgrounder: Norskott Havbruk (Scottish Sea Farms)

Legal threat demanding reply by 27 October:

On 12 October 2023, lawyers acting for [Scottish Sea Farms \(Norskott Havbruk\)](#) threatened legal action against ‘[extreme activist](#)’ and ‘[kayak vigilante](#)’ Don Staniford – read the letter from John Mackenzie on behalf of Shepherd & Wedderburn in full [online here](#) [1].

‘Digivan’ Tour

In addition to the past incidents noted above, and our client’s reasonably held belief that you will continue to act as you have done in the past, our client understands that you plan to attend at one of its processing plants near Oban on 5 November 2023, during the proposed “London to Edinburgh Digivan Tour”.¹

While our client respects your right to peacefully and lawfully protest, and in no way seeks to interfere with the responsible exercise of that right, this does not give you the right to board, access or otherwise interfere with our client’s property. Indeed, in a case involving Greenpeace, the court was clear that the lack of access to a particular location is not destructive of the right of freedom of expression or freedom of assembly. In short, you do not require access to our client’s facilities and premises in order to protest.

Action Required

Our client requires that you confirm in writing that you will immediately cease from:

1. boarding, entering onto, physically occupying, attaching yourself to, attaching vessels to, or approaching within 15 metres of all structures, docks, walkways, buildings, yards, floats, vessels, boats or pens of aquaculture sites of SSF (“**SSF’s Aquaculture Sites**”);
2. flying unmanned aircraft (a.k.a. drones) above SSF’s Aquaculture Sites;
3. operating unmanned underwater vehicles (a.k.a. drones) above SSF’s leased areas of the seabed, or within 15 metres of SSF’s Aquaculture Sites; and
4. instructing, procuring, encouraging or facilitating others to so act in your stead.

Our client requires this confirmation in writing by 4pm on 27 October 2023. Failing this, SSF will be left with no option but to raise court proceedings against you. If proceedings are raised, no further warning will be given to you beforehand.

Reaction from Don Staniford:

“Norway’s \$almafia has ridden roughshod over Scotland’s environmental, welfare and safety laws for far too long,” said Don Staniford, Director of \$camon \$cotland. “In the absence of government enforcement and intervention, covert surveillance and citizen science is vital to ground-truth the greenwash of RSPCA Assured, the Soil Association and the Aquaculture Stewardship Council. Fighting back against SLAPPs is the cornerstone of democracy and public accountability. Norwegian-owned companies like Norskott Havbruk (Scottish Sea Farms) and Mowi cannot be allowed to privatise the public commons and threaten free speech.”

SalMar & Leroy as owners of Norskott Havbruk – the world’s 2nd & 4th largest salmon farming companies (aka the \$almafia):


Norskott Havbruk (Scottish Sea Farms) – Scotland’s second largest salmon farming company - is a 50/50 joint venture owned by the Norwegian companies SalMar and Leroy Seafood [created in 2001 following the sale of Hydro Seafood GSP](#).

Parent undertakings and controlling parties

In the opinion of the directors, the company’s immediate parent undertaking is Norskott Havbruk AS, incorporated in Norway. It will include the company in its group financial statements, copies of which will be available from its registered office: Bontelabo 2, 5020 Bergen, Norway.

In the opinion of the directors, the company’s ultimate parent undertakings and controlling parties are Leroy Seafood Group ASA and Salmar ASA, both companies incorporated in Norway. Copies of their group financial statements, which include the company, are available from PO Box 7600, N-5020 Bergen, Norway, and N-216 Kverva, Norway, respectively.

In May 2023, [Intrafish reported that SalMar was the second largest salmon farming company in the world \(after Mowi\) with Leroy Seafood ranked fourth](#).



Swimming in \$almoney - £199 million turnover & £20.6 million operating profit:

The latest company accounts for Scottish Sea Farms – [filed at Companies House in November 2022](#) – reported a turnover of £199 million with an operating profit of £20.6 million. Scottish Sea Farms [has 57 marine sites, 3 freshwater sites and three processing plants](#).

The \$almafia/\$almobsters - cartel/price-fixing investigations in EU, USA & Canada:

In February 2019, Scottish Sea Farms was [raided as part of an EU price-fixing inquiry](#) (a cartel investigation is [still active](#) with [“billions of kroner in compensation, fines and legal costs” expected](#)). In May 2022, Leroy, SalMar, Cermaq, Mowi and Grieg [agreed to pay \\$85 million to end a three-year US court action over alleged price fixing](#). In October 2023, Leroy and SalMar

(along with other Norwegian salmon companies) [agreed to pay CAD 5.25 million \(€3.64million/\\$3.83 million\) in a Canada class action lawsuit relating to allegations of price fixing](#). Salmon Business [reported in March 2021](#):

“On April 4, 2014, SalMar’s Witzøe (SalMar’s largest shareholder) explained to its CEO Nordhammer that he had attended a dinner meeting with Lerøy’s [CEO] Beltestad, during which they discussed a pricing model for their salmon based on NASDAQ spot prices. Around the same time, Witzøe and Beltestad were communicating with Jim Gallagher of [Scottish Sea Farms] via email. In one of those emails, Gallagher referenced a recent conversation with Witzøe, and perhaps Beltestad as well, regarding NASDAQ prices. Gallagher confirmed that, as they had discussed, [Scottish Sea Farms] would make sure its prices were ahead of NASDAQ prices on a week-to-week basis”.

Increasing losses at Scottish Sea Farms in 2022 and 2023:

Scottish Sea Farms reported losses of £10.4 million in Q4 2022 citing issues with micro-jellyfish and amoebic gill disease. Fish Farming Expert [reported in February 2023](#): “It has been an extremely difficult quarter for (SSF holding company) Norskott Havbruk, with challenging biology,” said Lerøy in its Q4 2022 report. “Lerøy, which owns Norskott Havbruk 50/50 with fellow Norwegian salmon farmer SalMar, posted record revenue of NOK 26.6 billion in 2022, reflecting a year of high prices, driven by strong demand for seafood,” Operating profit before fair value adjustments was NOK 3.195 bn compared to NOK 2.518 bn in 2021.”

“Scottish Sea Farms has reduced its estimated harvest volume for 2023 from 37,000 gutted weight tonnes to 27,000 gwt as a result of biological problems at some sites that have continued from 2022, according to co-owner Lerøy,” [reported Fish Farming Expert in August 2023](#) under the headline ‘Scottish Sea Farms cuts harvest estimate by 10,000 tonnes’. “SSF made an operating loss of £10.6 million in the second quarter of this year, Lerøy said in its Q2 2023 report”.

Intrafish [reported in January 2023](#):

SalMar became the second-largest salmon farming company in the world following its deal to acquire rival Norway Royal Salmon.

The Witzoe family still controls almost half of SalMar through its investment firm Kverva, which also holds stakes in pelagic harvesting and processing giant Pelagia; processing, sales and trading group Insula; aquaculture health group Benchmark and land-based yellowtail producer The Kingfish Company, among several other holdings.

Witzoe has transferred most of his wealth and ownership in SalMar to his son, Gustav Magnar Witzoe, who now is one of Norway's wealthiest individuals and one of the richest people under 30 years old.

In 2021, the 29-year-old had a taxable fortune of NOK 19.8 billion (€1.9 billion/\$1.8 billion).

Despite his largesse, Gustav Magnar is pursuing a career of his own -- in modeling.

In an email to **IntraFish**, the younger Witzoe said that while he "has had the great pleasure of trying my hand at several jobs [at SalMar], my future role will be to exercise responsible ownership of the family company."

The younger Witzoe's disinterest in taking an operational role is fine with his 69-year-old father, who has no intention of leaving the business.

"I've been doing this since the dawn of time," he said. "I don't think I'll be able to stop."

Landmark Police Scotland apology to Don Staniford:

In October 2020, Police Scotland [issued a landmark apology](#) over improper policing at salmon farms operated by Scottish Sea Farms in Loch Linnhe and Loch Creran.

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Police apologise to fish farm welfare campaigner



Mr Staniford, an award-winning campaigner and author, hailed it as 'watershed victory'.

He said: 'Police Scotland has effectively reinforced the legality of filming at salmon farms. Police Scotland has sent a powerful message to their own officers that they cannot act as private security guards for companies.'

'The public has an inalienable right to navigate – including kayaking and diving – in public waters where salmon farms operate.'

'The message from Scottish Salmon Watch to salmon farming companies is crystal clear – we're watching you and we have the law on our side,' said Mr Staniford.

'Despite legal threats of salmon farming companies, the legitimacy of video surveillance and public monitoring of salmon farms is irrefutable. Salmon farms cannot keep the public out of public waters – whether they are collecting effluent samples, diving under the cages or kayaking safely.'

Mr Staniford has called on police to respond with the same enthusiasm when he has asked them to investigate allegations of welfare abuse under wildlife legislation.

Whistleblower - “They don’t care about fish welfare”:

In November 2020, [Scottish Salmon Watch was contacted by a whistleblower](#) following up the [shocking news of welfare abuse by RSPCA Assured Scottish Sea Farms in Loch Creran](#). "They don't care about fish welfare," said the whistleblower attaching an email from Innes Weir ([appointed regional manager for the Scottish mainland at Scottish Sea Farms in December 2019](#)). "Health manager and the cleaner fish department laid off in the summer from Scottish Sea Farms, now we're seeing the result".

The email from Innes Weir (30 June 2020) told staff at Scottish Sea Farms that the biological services team of Sean Black and Daniel Carcajona "will leave" even though they "have been instrumental in developing and delivering new standards and fish welfare over recent years".

Sean Black [left Scottish Sea Farms in July 2020](#) and is now greenwashing Scottish salmon as [Senior Scientific Officer \(Aquaculture\) with RSPCA Assured](#).

“Just a quick email regarding your blog post yesterday, ‘[Leaked Email: Staff Cuts at Scottish Sea Farms Compromise Fish Welfare](#)’, in which you feature three images of existing and former Scottish Sea Farms’ employees: Innes, Sean and Daniel,” [wrote Scottish Sea Farms in November 2020](#). “In respect of their right to privacy, could you please remove these images from your post. Innes, Sean and Daniel have not given you consent under the Data Protection Act 2018 for any imagery featuring them to be used, retained or published by you. As such, we ask that you remove these three particular images from your post.”

Legal threat by lawyers acting for Scottish Sea Farms over photos of diseased salmon:

The Ferret [reported in August 2018](#) that lawyers acting for Scottish Sea Farms (Shepherd and Wedderburn) threatened legal action against the disclosure of photos of disease-ridden Scottish salmon. Scottish Sea Farms argued unsuccessfully that [disclosure of photos would “incite activists to take action against salmon producers”](#):

Regulation 10(5)(a) applies to the request as the disclosure would be likely to prejudice substantially public safety. As mentioned, the release of the photographs without context could lead to publication and use to incite activists to take action against salmon producers and to harass or threaten our staff.

Precedent 1: intimidation of staff

While farming animals and fish for food is a world-apart from drug testing, the case of Huntington Life Sciences (2007) is a strong example of just how far activists can take things.

In 2007, the Cambridgeshire-based laboratory came under attack and intimidation from:

- Masked protestors smashing up labs and surrounding homes of company directors
- Hoax bombs which were sent to victims’ houses, abusive phone calls and threats of violence against employees
- 'Murderer', 'puppy killer' and 'scum' being daubed on homes and cars
- Leaflets being distributed near some company directors’ homes falsely telling neighbours they were convicted paedophiles; others had blood-stained personal items sent through the post saying the blood was HIV positive.

A spokesman for Glaxo SmithKline condemned the attacks, which it said: “were clearly designed to disrupt work and terrorise employees”. A spokesman said the firm helped test life-saving drugs.

An [email from Scottish Sea Farms \(name redacted\) dated 12 June 2018](#) concluded:

The photographs of our fish are meaningless to the untrained eye, other than for graphic depiction of pathology for the purposes of shock effect. There is no need for these images to be released and to do so will harm Scottish Sea Farms' commercial reputation as the photos are likely to be interpreted incorrectly and used against us. Marine Scotland must question the reasoning behind a request for the release of such photos and the misleading damage that could result to the reputation of Scottish Sea Farms and other salmon producers. In addition it seems wholly inappropriate that such images should be released by a Government body with no context and in breach of the Code of Professional Conduct for Veterinarian Surgeons, and by extension para-veterinary professionals. It is in the public interest for the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons (not Marine Scotland) to decide what information should and should not be protected by the Code of Professional Conduct for Veterinarian Surgeons.

I must stress we remain very concerned at the prospect of release of graphic images of sampled moribund fish with farms being identified, being unrepresentative of both the specific population in question as well as across the industry.

An [email from Scottish Sea Farms \(name redacted\) dated 7 June 2018](#) argued that disclosure of photographs “will have an adverse impact on Scottish Sea Farms’ legitimate economic interests” and “exposes Scottish Sea Farms to reputational damage”:

2.2 Disclosure of these photographs will prejudice substantially the confidentiality of commercial/industrial information by releasing information which is protected. Release of such confidential information will have an adverse impact on Scottish Sea Farms’ legitimate economic interests, should the photographs be used against us. We are also very concerned about the lack of context around release of the photographs. Even if Marine Scotland were to release these photographs within the context of pathology reports and case notes, there would be no obligation upon the recipient to use them within such context and therefore they are open to misinterpretation by the general public. They are at best meaningless to an untrained eye, at worst liable to deliberate or accidental misinterpretation and could easily be used against Scottish Sea Farms by the requestor, in circumstances which do not take account of the context in which these photographs were taken. This exposes Scottish Sea Farms to reputational damage which would have an adverse impact on our legitimate economic interests.



Breach of legal requirements for food safety & animal welfare at Leroy in Norway:

Salmon Business [reported in October 2023](#): “Salmon farming giant Lerøy Seafood is under scrutiny after the Norwegian Food Safety Authority uncovered poor handling practices at one of its facilities off the island of Hitra, Norway. As part of a surprise inspection on Sep. 21, officials claim to have discovered dead and dying salmon being processed for human consumption at a Lerøy facility, resulting in an immediate ban on the further harvest and sale of the fish, [according to Norwegian broadcaster NRK](#). The Food Safety Authority observed high mortality rates in the cages and cited the company for several breaches of food and aquaculture animal regulations. The citations relate to the handling of fish that had died before the harvest process, in breach of legal requirements for food safety and animal welfare.”

"We take Norwegian Food Safety Authority's claims and findings seriously," a Leroy executive told IntraFish.

The Norwegian Food Safety Authority has suspended Norway-based seafood giant Leroy Seafood's harvest at its Reitholmen facility in western Norway following a local media report claiming that ill and dead fish were on its way to consumers.

Lifeless salmon floated in the water and were harvested to be sold as food, the Norwegian Food Safety Authority told Norwegian news service *NRK*.

"There was mass death when we arrived. To us it appeared as if they pumped fish on board that was already dead and harvested it," Norwegian Food Safety Authority Division Manager Lennart Floyd Berge told *NRK*.

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1.9 million young fish die at Lerøy smolt facility

Norwegian salmon farmer Lerøy lost 1.9 million smolts in a die-off at one of its land-based facilities earlier this month, it has been reported.

"Lerøy Sjøtroll Kjærelva has had an incident in the pre-smolt department in the facility where we lost close to 1.9 million smolt that were due to go to sea in December, and March 2024," Lerøy Sjøtroll general manager Morten E Fjæreide told one of Fish Farming Exoert's Norwegian sister sites, LandbasedAQ.

"We take fish welfare very seriously and are upset by having suffered such a great loss. Our focus now is to deal with the acute situation, and work to find the root cause of the incident. We would like to take this opportunity to praise our employees who have stood up in this demanding situation."

When it comes to production, he explained that Lerøy is in a position to replace the smolt from other facilities in the value chain.

According to Norway's Directorate of Fisheries, a total of 60 million farmed salmon and rainbow trout died in the sea in in Norway last year, while 141 million died in land-based facilities.

Exact numbers of dead farmed salmon are not known in Scotland – since [lobbying in 2013 by Salmon Scotland \(whose members include Scottish Sea Farms and Mowi\) stopped publication of the 'commercially damaging' data](#). However, mortality information that is [published by the Scottish Environment Protection Agency, Scottish Government and Salmon Scotland](#) shows alarming increases in mass mortalities. Data on mortality rates [published by Salmon Scotland in October 2023](#) reveals shocking death rates at Scottish Sea Farms during August 2023:

The company that supplies Marks and Spencer with its Scottish salmon is being investigated by welfare authorities after underwater cameras captured images of fish covered in lice.

Diseased and dead salmon inside facilities owned by Scottish Sea Farms were recorded this month by Don Staniford, a campaigner. The RSPCA, which has previously endorsed the salmon as being “responsibly sourced”, has begun an investigation. The company said the claims were unfounded and part of an “orchestrated campaign”.

Staniford, the founder of Scottish Salmon Watch, filmed at four fish farms off the west coast of Scotland. Salmon are shown covered in parasites, with open wounds and with eyes and chunks of their flesh missing. He said: “This gruesome video evidence shows lice infestations literally eating Scottish salmon alive. It demonstrates why CCTV must be installed in all salmon farms in Scotland. M&S should hang their heads in shame.”

Viva!, an animal rights charity, said “frequent outbreaks of [parasitic sea lice](#) on Scottish salmon farms” were killing off wild populations in the region.

There are 200 Scottish fish farms which contribute about £1 billion to the UK economy every year. The RSPCA said: “We are concerned by the allegations of poor welfare and some of the images and launched an investigation as soon as they were reported to us.”



Underwater drones film 'monstrous invasions' of parasites at salmon farms

Activists say footage reveals fish stricken by sea lice and jellyfish on Scottish farms that supply supermarkets

Lochs in the Highlands of Scotland are among the most spectacular and pristine wild life areas in Britain. They are also a production line for what have become supermarket staples: smoked and fresh salmon.

The salmon industry says fish health and welfare are at the heart

The footage shows many salmon infested with parasitic sea lice. The farms are operated by leading food producers supplying UK supermarkets and overseas markets, with salmon one of Britain's biggest food exports.

The report stated: "The rapid expansion of open-net marine salmon and rainbow trout farming in Scotland in the last 30 years has led to increasing concern about parasitic sea lice infestations on these farms, and the threat these pose to the health and survival of wild and farmed salmon."

The Observer reported in January how salmon deaths on fish farms in Scotland nearly doubled last year owing to growing levels of disease, parasites and jellyfish bloom. Micro jellyfish, which may be linked to warming oceans, are a threat blocking or snagging fish gills, leading to death.

Salmon Scotland, which represents the producers, said farms were working hard to manage sea lice numbers. It said the industry was transparent

Salmon Scotland said various factors are involved in the decline of wild salmon, such as river water quality, which it said is occurring in Europe.

Scottish Sea Farms said the recent sea lice counts at its three Loch Kishorn farms were low, with an average of 0.28 adult females per fish, it said high levels of micro jellyfish were found in June, which threatened the fish, and they were harvested early.


Benji MacIsaac, CEO of Fishabout, said the company had invested in new technology to combat sea lice, with two vessels in Scotland installed with large tanks for freshwater treatments.

"Sea lice do not survive in freshwater," he said. "If you don't have the right tools, the sea lice numbers can escalate. We are ahead of the problem."

An infectious salmon anemia (ISA) outbreak at a site in Flatanger municipality in Trondelag county in central Norway has been confirmed.

Salmon farming giant SalMar and the smaller Veterinaermedisinsk Oppdragscenter farm salmon at the site, according to the Norwegian Food Safety Authority.

The facility's fish health service notified the Norwegian Food Safety Authority on Sept. 26 of findings compatible with suspicion of ISA, and the suspicion was confirmed by the Norwegian Food Safety Authority on Oct. 4 based on an analysis from the Veterinary Institute.

The location was already in a monitoring zone for ISA.

AN INVESTIGATION is continuing into the cause of a sickness which saw staff in the processing plant of a west coast of Scotland fish farm walk out over fears for their health.



Staff at Scottish Sea Farms site in Connel, left their posts on October 11 after feeling ill and coughing and vomiting.

One Scottish Sea Farms employee, who did not wish to be named, said the sickness had been ongoing for 'two to three' weeks.

The staff member has worked at the South Shian site, which employs 37 people in the processing area, for several years and has never experienced issues like this before.

He said: 'Everyone in the processing area is coughing, vomiting and feeling like their chest is tight. Over 20 people are feeling ill on a daily basis.'

Loch Creran barge death firms have £640,000 fines cut

Two companies who were fined a total of £640,000 over the deaths of two men on a fish farm barge in Argyll have had their penalties cut by appeal judges.

Maarten Pieter Den Heijer, 30, and 45-year-old Robert MacDonal died on Loch Creran, near Oban, in May 2009.

Scottish Sea Farms was fined £600,000 and Logan Inglis was fined £40,000 over health and safety breaches.

Appeal court judges agreed the fines were too harsh and reduced them to £333,335 and £20,000 respectively.

The original fines were imposed by Sheriff Douglas Small last year after the case was heard at Oban Sheriff Court.

[10] In mitigation before the sheriff the solicitor for Scottish Sea Farms Ltd relied on the company's previous good health and safety record, their lack of previous convictions, the acknowledgement that their health and safety training was generally of a high standard, their ready acceptance of liability, and the remedial measures taken by them. Considerable support had been given by the company to the families of the deceased and to those employees who had been affected by their deaths in the aftermath of the incident. It was explained that the company had a turnover of £93,968,000 and a gross profit of £11,031,000.

Mowi, a Norwegian company that owns several sites in Scotland, has asked a Scottish court to grant a permanent interdict, the equivalent of an injunction, against Don Staniford.

The organisation said it repeatedly asked Mr Staniford not to enter their farms and that he continues to do so puts "himself and the company's employees and animals at risk".

Mowi wants to prevent Mr Staniford from entering onto, attaching vessels to or approaching within 15 metres of all structures, docks, walkways, buildings, floats or pens at its salmon aquaculture farming sites.

On Thursday, Mr Staniford agreed not to enter Mowi's site until the court proceedings are completed.

Don Staniford is an English environmental activist and blogger who runs an organisation dedicated to the exposure of Scottish salmon farming misdeeds called \$camon \$cotland, previously called Scottish Salmon Watch. He is being sued by a company called MOWI (previously called Marine Harvest), one of the largest seafood companies in the world. Don regularly uploads videos and blogs onto his website and some have even been used in newspaper articles and a popular Netflix documentary film, Seaspiracy. He has dedicated much of his time to bringing to light any malpractice, welfare abuse and violation to health and sanitary standards of the salmon farms.

In response to Don's blogs and videos, in 2017, MOWI began sending emails on a consistent basis for five years requesting Don to take down (within 48 hours) videos, graphics and blogs he'd created about the company's salmon fish farms or risk legal proceedings being initiated. Don stood by his videos and blogs and refused to take down the majority of the material he had created. MOWI did not take kindly to his steadfastness and in response in September 2021, Don was served with an interdict (injunction) to stop him from going within 15 metres of any MOWI-owned vessel or structure, flying a drone within 50m of the fish farms, and harassing staff members. The court proceedings are underway and Don plans on fighting to the end and continues to hold salmon farmers accountable for their misconduct.

Scottish salmon producer Mowi has denied it wants to gag a campaigner by banning him from its fish farms, in a civil case heard at Oban Sheriff Court on 1 June.

Mowi Scotland Ltd is [pursuing an interdict](#) to prevent environmental activist Don Staniford coming within 15 metres of its fish farms.

Acting for the defender, Don Staniford, advocate Simon Crabb called for the "ridiculously extravagant" action to be dismissed.

"Mr Staniford is a journalist and carries out watchdog functions," he said. "A picture tells a thousand words. Images do not lie.

"His source material informs mass media and welfare complaints.

"There is a necessity. There is a public interest. There is a genuinely held belief, which gives him right to investigate what he believes is unlawful practices.

"Mr Staniford is trying to expose unlawful conduct. He is there to protect the fish.

"It is not the case that journalists say 'okay we will leave it up to the authorities', especially with a vulnerable population. Wildlife do not have a voice.

"They require someone like Don Staniford to do that lawfully, which the law in Scotland allows him to do.

"The defender's ability to inform the public depends on his access to the waters where the salmon farms are located.

"His lawful authority comes from his right to navigate the public waters and do any act that is incidental to that.


"Mowi have employed an excessive restriction on the freedom of navigation.

"Any presence has been passive and temporary. He does not attend in large numbers. He attends with journalists.

"Potentially we could have kayakers and yachters being told by Mowi to stay off the water and keep the cameras away.

"I want to take down the industry," he says, adding that, to do so, he must "make its horror visible". Over the next ten days, he will drive more than 300 miles along the coast, paddling out to salmon farms at dawn in his kayak and boarding them – then filming the conditions in which the fish live. He has to do so undercover because he is already in legal trouble. The Norwegian company Mowi, the world's largest salmon producer, has launched a court case against him in the hope of banning him from approaching its farms.

Mowi said it was seeking a court order against Staniford to address "dangerous, unauthorised incursions that breach our strict health and safety protocols and have an unacceptable impact on the mental health of our staff. Despite repeated requests not to do so, he has continued to put himself and the company's employees and animals at risk."



Scottish Sea Farms Limited (“SSF”)

Our client operates over 60 aquaculture sites across Scotland and within the UK’s territorial waters, including on the foreshore.

Incursions

For several years, you and other individuals have regularly accessed (or at least sought to access) our client’s fish farms, marine assets and other land-based facilities without our client’s consent. Our client tells us that it has documented, and has evidence of, numerous examples of incursions at its facilities. These include, but are not limited to, the following:

Date	Location	Activity
August 2018	Loch Spelve	You accessed, and filmed from, the gangways and pens at our client’s fish farm.
July 2019	Shuna	You accessed, and filmed from, the gangways and pens at our client’s fish farm. You were also videoing within a pen and untying nets at our client’s fish farm.
July 2020	Loch Creran	You attended at our client’s fish farm and while there, an individual who accompanied you, Matthew Mellen, dived and swam within our client’s leased area.
May 2021	Loch Spelve	You accessed, and filmed from, the gangways into a pen (or pens) at our client’s fish farm.
July 2022	Finuary, Sound of Mull	You boarded our client’s vessel.
February 2023	South Shian Processing site	You attended our client’s processing facility, videoing the facility and staff, and verbally abusing members of our client’s staff.
May 2023	Shuna Point	Our facility and staff were filmed carrying out their work. It is believed the footage was captured using a drone. You also accessed a barge at our client’s fish farm, removed cable ties and opened mortality bins.
June 2023	Kishorn	You were videoing within a pen and untying nets at our client’s fish farm.

Our client has no indication that you will desist from this behaviour and reasonably concludes that these incursions will continue absent you agreeing to stop, or our client taking action to prevent future incursions.

Health & Safety and Biosecurity

Your actions are not only unacceptable to our client because you are accessing our client's property without its consent, but because at least some of your actions pose a danger to you and jeopardise the welfare of the fish.

Our client assesses and reviews work related risks by carrying out risk assessments. It then puts in place appropriate arrangements for planning, organising, controlling, monitoring and reviewing any risks identified. In terms of its employees, our client puts in place arrangements for implementing its health and safety policy and to train its staff. In addition, our client's staff also have the necessary training and understanding to enable them to comply with the relevant biosecurity requirements.

Our client has no reason to believe that you understand any of the identified risks, have the requisite biosecurity training or comply with the relevant biosecurity requirements. Even if you did, which is not accepted, that would still not give you the right to access our client's property without SSF's consent.

Mowi's court action

Our client is aware of the proceedings that were brought against you by Mowi Scotland Limited ("**Mowi**") in Oban Sheriff Court. We enclose a copy of the court's judgment.

As you know, the Sheriff repelled your defences, and rejected your argument that granting an interdict would interfere with exercising your right of navigation and that any interdict would restrict your actions as a "campaigner, journalist or the like."

Therefore, you have now been prohibited (interdicted) from doing any of the following:

- (i) "boarding, entering onto, physically occupying, attaching himself to, attaching vessels to or approaching within 15 metres of all structures, docks, walkways, buildings, floats or pens of salmon aquaculture farming sites of [Mowi];
- (ii) flying unmanned aircraft, also known as drones, above [Mowi's sites]; and
- (iii) instructing, procuring, encouraging or facilitating others to so act."

'Digivan' Tour

In addition to the past incidents noted above, and our client's reasonably held belief that you will continue to act as you have done in the past, our client understands that you plan to attend at one of its processing plants near Oban on 5 November 2023, during the proposed "London to Edinburgh Digivan Tour".¹

While our client respects your right to peacefully and lawfully protest, and in no way seeks to interfere with the responsible exercise of that right, this does not give you the right to board, access or otherwise interfere with our client's property. Indeed, in a case involving Greenpeace, the court was clear that the lack of access to a particular location is not destructive of the right of freedom of expression or freedom of assembly. In short, you do not require access to our client's facilities and premises in order to protest.

Action Required

Our client requires that you confirm in writing that you will immediately cease from:

1. boarding, entering onto, physically occupying, attaching yourself to, attaching vessels to, or approaching within 15 metres of all structures, docks, walkways, buildings, yards, floats, vessels, boats or pens of aquaculture sites of SSF ("**SSF's Aquaculture Sites**");
2. flying unmanned aircraft (a.k.a. drones) above SSF's Aquaculture Sites;
3. operating unmanned underwater vehicles (a.k.a. drones) above SSF's leased areas of the seabed, or within 15 metres of SSF's Aquaculture Sites; and
4. instructing, procuring, encouraging or facilitating others to so act in your stead.

Our client requires this confirmation in writing by 4pm on 27 October 2023. Failing this, SSF will be left with no option but to raise court proceedings against you. If proceedings are raised, no further warning will be given to you beforehand.

In the meantime, our client reserves all of its rights.
