EXPOSED: Bakkafrost's 'Scottish' Salmon Scam Fuelled by the Bloody Faroes!

Scamon Scotland is calling for an immediate ban on shipments of fish feed from the Faroe Islands via Bakkafrost's fish feed subsidiary Havsbrun.



“The Faroe Islands is the blood salmon capital of the world,” said Don Staniford, Director of \$camon \$cotland who [recently visited the Faroes on a mission with Neptune’s Pirates UK](#). “Importing fish feed from the Faroes to fuel the expansion of ‘Scottish’ salmon farming is unethical and unsustainable. If Bakkafrost’s imports of Havsbrun fish feed are not illegal or unsafe then they are certainly immoral. Scottish Ministers must come clean to the electorate that a vote for the SNP supports the deadly Faroese/Norwegian-owned \$almafia.”



“Last month I visited the Faroe Islands and was horrified at the presence of Russian supertrawlers side by side with huge fishing ships from Africa,” continued Staniford. “Salmon farming is stealing precious protein out of the mouths of marine wildlife as well as starving people all around the world. Bakkafrost’s ‘Greed of Feed’ must be stopped dead in its tracks before millions more RSPCA Assured Scottish salmon suffer unnecessarily and die horrific deaths inside diseased feedlots. Consumers buying Bakkafrost’s ‘Scottish’ salmon have blood on their hands.”

\$camon \$cotland filed Freedom of Information requests with Border Control (the Home Office), Falkirk Council and North Ayrshire Council on Friday (14 June 2024). FOI requests filed in May 2024 with the Scottish Government, the Animal and Plant Health Agency and Food Standards Scotland were denied [1].

Background on Havsbrun (Bakkafrost) fish feed at Fairlie Quay:

In late April 2024, Scamon Scotland received a tip-off that something fishy was going on at [Fairlie Quay marina](#) in Ayrshire. Photographs taken on 29 April 2024 show fish feed bags – believed to be nearly 1,000 tonnes – off-loaded from the Faroes-registered [Hav Sand](#) and later stored inside a boat shed:



Whilst hundreds and hundreds of the [Havsbrun](#) fish feed bags were stored in the [boat shed at Farlie Quay](#), many more bags were transported via trucks:



The feed bags are sourced from [Bakkafrost's subsidiary Havsbrun](#) in the Faroe Islands:





WELCOME TO PORT OF FUGLAFJØRÐ



REGULATIONS FOR THE PORT OF FUGLAFJØRÐUR, APPLICABLE TO SHIPS AND COMPANIES IN CONNECTION WITH RECEIPT AND CONSIGNMENT OF GOODS.

- Any loading or unloading is to be conducted in accordance with the following regulations and guidelines.
- The consignor or the consignee and cargo loaders/unloaders are to ensure that all suction pipes, hoses or otherwise are secured and fitted in such a way that no spillages or leaks occur in the pipework, including couplers and fittings.
- Debris, litter, spillages or anything else in the harbour area, basin or fjord as a byproduct from loading or unloading cargo, is to be contained and retrieved by the person(s) responsible for the cargo. The cargo owner carries full responsibility for this being undertaken.
- Tank cleaning or similar operations while the vessel is on the fjord or harbour basin are strictly prohibited.
- Abide by noise pollution ordinances.
- Cargo owners are liable to any costs incurred by failure to abide by these regulations.
- In case of disputes caused opposing or erroneous interpretations, the Faroese regulations overrule the translated version.





International Assurance

We have a responsibility to make sure that food and feed imported into and exported from Scotland meets legal requirements. The International Assurance Branch coordinate programmes to make sure that imported and exported food and feed are safe.

Imported food

We work with the Food Standards Agency (FSA) and the UK Office for Sanitary and Phyto-Sanitary Trade Assurance to deliver risk assessments and where required audit, in response to requests from third countries to provide access to the UK market for particular commodities.

On 6 June 2024, Scamon Scotland took video footage of Havsbrun feed bags being offloaded from a haulage truck onto a boat destined for Bakkafrost's Glenan Bay salmon farm in Loch Fyne:









REQUEST FOR INFORMATION: Salmon feed imports to Scotland

Thank you for your request for information of 10th May about Salmon feed imports to Scotland. APHA have handled your request under the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOIA).

Your information request and our response are set out below.

“Please provide information on salmon feed imports to Scotland since 1 January 2024.

Please include all emails, import certificates, documents, testing results, food safety aspects, photos, videos, letters, licences and any other information.

As background, [****] was recently tipped off with respect to a shipment of salmon feed into Fairlie Quay on 2 May 2024 from Havsbrun in the Faroes to Bakkafrost Scotland via the Hav Sand tanker:

An insider suggested that an import issue - perhaps to do with paperwork or testing of feed ingredients - had held up the shipment (estimated at 930 tonnes) leading to bags and bags of feed being stored in the boatyard at Fairlie Quay (see photo above and below).

Please include any documents and information relating to the above in this FOI reply.”

Your request has been withheld under Section 12 of the Freedom of Information Act.

Section 12 (cost limit)

APHA can refuse a request if deciding whether the information is held would mean we exceed the cost limit under the FOIA because it would require an extensive search of a large amount of documents.

By virtue of section 12(2) of the FOIA, APHA may refuse to disclose information if the request for the information would involve the diversion of resources and incur excessive cost, in some of the circumstances of the case, the public interest in applying the exemption outweighs the public interest in disclosing the information. In reaching our decision with respect to the public interest, we considered the following matters:

Section 12(2) of the FOIA also requires public authorities to apply a presumption in favour of disclosure. However, there is a strong public interest in withholding the information. Gathering the specific information requested would involve a significant cost and diversion of resources from APHA's other work.

Reviewing any individual documents from in-excess of 200 records to establish whether the specific information is available for the response (some documents would also need to be redacted according to the appropriate exceptions engaged), would be a costly exercise. This would clearly represent a significant cost in terms of staff time to establish whether APHA may hold information in scope of your request and would disproportionately divert resources from the provision of other public services.

It has been estimated that accessing records to obtain specific details for each import will exceed the appropriate limit, which currently stands at £600 (£25 per hour). On the basis of our estimates, we consider that the cost would far exceed this limit and, as such, we are refusing your request.

APHA consider that your request falls under section 12(2) on cost and resource grounds in determining whether all the information is held. Having carried out the above investigation, we have concluded that, in all the circumstances of the case, the public interest falls in favour of applying the exemption.

Section 16 (Advice and Assistance)

Section 16 of FOIA requires APHA to provide advice and assistance to help you to focus more clearly on information that would satisfy your request without a significant burden on the Agency. Unfortunately, your request requires the locating and examining of many individual documents. If you were to significantly reduce the timeframe of the request and be specific in the documents you seek, APHA may be able to respond to your request, however this is not guaranteed. It may also be useful for you to know that APHA can only obtain data under the commodity description 'Animal Feeding Stuff' and cannot narrow this down to a species such as salmon.

Please also know that APHA have no remit in the enforcement of products of animal origin as these imports are regulated by the Port Health Authority at the border. You may wish to contact Border Force and/or the Port Health Authority to request specific information.

As context, Scamon Scotland filed a FOI on 10 May 2024 with the Scottish Government, Food Standards Scotland and APHA/DEFRA. APHA's FOI reply dated 10 June 2024 suggested that I contact Border Force and/or the Port Health Authority.

Please see attached for more detailed background - from the information obtained thus far it seems that Bakkafrøst imported perhaps as much as 930 tonnes of Havsbrun fish feed into Fairlie Quay on 29 April 2024 (batch 2024/16-20) via the Hav Sand cargo ship from Fuglafjord in the Faroe Islands. 


